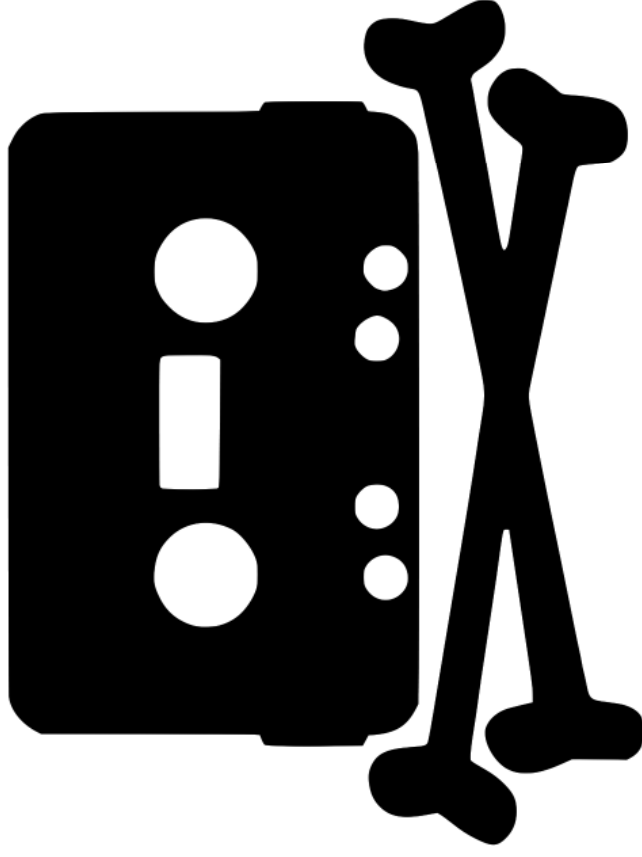

>>PARTING THOUGHTS

Why would anyone pirate anyway? People have all sorts of reasons – because they're broke as hell, because they believe data should be free, because they can. I'm not quite at that level yet but I'm learning and when I'm able to do it know I'll be putting out a guide on that.

>>INTRODUCTION

After the strengthening of anti-piracy laws in Japan that took down the anime streaming site Kissanime (r.i.p) and reading up on all the outrage and drama surrounding that, I realized there's a whole generation of people who don't know how to pirate shit. I was actually shocked at this, I just sort of took it for granted that it was common knowledge and every kid and their parent knew how to pirate shit. I mean back when I was in middle school pretty much everyone knew and there were so many people, irl and almost everywhere on the internet, who were enthusiastic about teaching new people how to do this.

I shudder to think about this new generation of broke and/or bored kids missing out on casually committing 30 felonies a day and just getting away with it. What kind of person would I be if at 12 years old I wasn't up at 3 in the morning pirating episodes of Inuyasha and Linkin Park albums? (don't judge me both of those are still great.)

But I should probably have expected this to a degree, the internet that exists now is not the same internet I grew up with. When I was younger the internet was still kind of decentralized, but it was in the process of becoming centralized. Facebook, twitter, youtube, reddit, etc. were all still getting started and communities still coalesced around a thousand different forums. Things were more difficult to find, internet forensics and govt. tracking was still young, kids were still on the open internet teaching each other how to hack. It was good times, this was between 2006-2010. Things are much different now though. You can still find some smaller forums if you look, but most of all internet communities are centralized on Facebook, Twitter, Reddit, Discord, platforms which are all heavily moderated, profitable by selling user data to governments and advertisers, and especially for big social media platforms like Facebook, are essentially another arm of policing. Communities are centralized and you are constantly tracked and surveilled. It sucks.

Even in this state, piracy still goes on! But unfortunately, even piracy began to centralize, and that's how we get websites like Kissanime and Kissmanga, Popcorn Time, 123Movies, etc. They are more convenient than pirating it yourself, but neither culture, communities, knowledge, nor piracy thrive in centralized environments. The kind of convenience these sites create reduces the circulation of skills and knowledge of piracy and unlike decentralized piracy, when these centralized nodes are taken down it's all gone and we're left with a bunch of people who don't know what to do. It's incredibly heart-breaking.

And that's why I'm making this guide, because the skills and knowledge of piracy were cultivated by everyone and belong to everyone. I'd be both a shitty pirate and a shitty anarchist if I kept all of this to myself. People tend to feel daunted by piracy, like you have to be some ultra smart tech specialist to do it, but that's far from the truth. Like most illegal internet shit, it's actually incredibly easy but a lot of time and money and effort goes into spreading myths about it all being hard so specialists can keep their position and profit socially or monetarily off of it and so states and corporations can keep some semblance of internet stability and security.

>>TOOLS

You only need two pieces of software - a Bittorrent client and a VPN.

>>BitTorrent Client<<

If you've been on the internet for a while you may have heard of torrenting and may, like many people, mistake torrenting for pirating. Torrenting itself is completely legal. BitTorrent is just a peer-2-peer file sharing protocol that's used pretty extensively. The peer-2-peer nature of it means it's decentralized, so instead of a central server hosting and sending the files, the files are basically hosted by everyone who downloads the file &

But for the sake of ease here are some torrenting websites I tend to use;

- **thepiratebay.org**, the OG. It's not as updated as often as it used to be but it still works fine. Movies, games, music, software, ebooks, if it's digital you can probably find it there. It goes down sometimes but it always comes back up.
- **1337x.to**, another very solid all-purpose torrent site.
- **yts.mx**, a movie-specific torrent site.
- **nyaa.si**, an anime-specific torrent site if you're weeb trash like me.

You need to be a little discerning on torrent downloading because sometimes assholes put viruses in them. ThePirateBay tends to be where this happens the most. Generally the most popular torrents tend to be virus-free, as you pirate more you'll start to figure out which crews consistently put out quality virus-free shit, and on websites with comments be sure to read through the comments to get a sense of if it's legit. It's hard to give solid advice because it's really about internet literacy – if on a webpage you have trouble discerning real download links from sketchy fake ones you'll probably have some problems (and also it's 2020 why aren't you using an adblocker?), but the only way to learn is by trial and error!

So now you've found what you want and you're ready to download! All you do now is click the download link or magnet link (which is just another form of download link but not attached to the website to get around anti-piracy shit) and your download will open up in your BitTorrent client and now you just sit back, relax, and wait for it to finish! After it finished it will start “seeding” which is just re-uploading and sharing the file to others

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You've got your tools all set up, so now you're ready to pirate? Not so fast! There's a little bit of set up you need to do. First of all if you're using qBittorrent, open it up, go to Tools – Options – BitTorrent and check Enable Anonymous Mode. This enables some extra security features to help mask your IP and such. I'm not sure if other BitTorrent clients have a similar option so you may need to do a little research. Then shut down your BitTorrent client.

This next part is incredibly important:

Always make sure you connect to your VPN before you open your BitTorrent client, and **ALWAYS CHECK THAT YOU ARE ACTUALLY CONNECTED BEFORE TORRENTING.**

So, now you've connected to your VPN and opened your BitTorrent client, you're ready to pirate! But where does one find pirated software on the internet? You'll have to do some searching around, but there are plenty of torrenting sites around. If you search something like 'whatever torrent' you'll probably find something. But please please **PLEASE do not use google to search**, google sucks and logs so much data its terrifying. Use DuckDuckGo, it doesn't log anything. Fuck google.

act as a mini-server, everyone downloading and re-uploading the file share bits of the file between each other. Because of the way BitTorrent handles files by chopping them up and sharing the download and upload between all users it's a popular choice for sharing large files.

The software for torrenting tends to be free, and I would personally recommend **qBittorrent** because it's open source and unlike some of the popular clients like **uTorrent**, it doesn't have ads.

>>**VPN**<<

VPN stands for Virtual Private Network and it basically obscures your location and network traffic by routing it through a sever, or series of servers, somewhere else in the world and encrypting the data. This is important because *it stops your internet service provider from seeing what you're doing*, and *it obscures your IP address*, which is an identifier for your network (though it doesn't identify your personal device, thats a MAC address that does). This is important because *the IP address is what gets people caught because it is publicly visible* in BitTorrent clients for everyone that is downloading or seeding a torrent.

There are so many VPNs to choose from, so it's important to choose wisely. The whole impetus of choosing your VPN is that you don't trust your ISP, so you have to make sure you trust your VPN. Some of the things you're looking for are that *it doesn't require personal information* and *it has a minimal data retention policy*, and you want one that is *outside of the jurisdiction of any of the 5 Eyes Countries* (US, UK, Canada, Australia, New Zealand).

My VPN recommendation is **Mullvad**. It's based in Sweden

which has pretty solid privacy laws and isn't a part of 5 Eyes. They have a solid minimal data retention policy, you don't even have to sign up because they just assign you a random account number when you access the website. You can pay by mailing cash (which I do) or via crypto currencies. Its also cheap at just 5.50\$ USD a month, and you can set it up on 5 different devices so you can go in on itwith a couple friends.

But one may ask, "*Whats the point of buying a VPN to pirate stuff? Doesn't that defeat the purpose?*" and that's a fair point, but unfortunately there aren't good free VPNs for torrenting and it's a shame. But if you, for whatever reason, really can't or don't want to pay for a VPN, **Windscribe** is a decent free one that generally meets the criteria however there are two issues. The first issue is that *you are limited to 10GB a month*. The next issue is *it's based in Canada, one of the 5 Eyes Countries*. But I have used it plenty of times before and have been okay, but if you are uploading your own pirated shit or doing any other kind of sketchy illegal shit I would not trust it.

5.50\$ USD is much better than thousands of dollars in fines and/or prison time.
